The first burial was on 26th August 1896 and it's last on the 09th April 1952.

There is 1255 named individual within the 634 graves, which were marked with a simple number plaque.

If you are aware of the history, you may know the majority of the plaques where thrown away and many headstones removed as deemed dangerous a few years ago.

We are currently in talks with NHS Lanarkshire to have an entrance board with the history of the cemetery placed at the gate and 4 other plaques at the corners of the cemetery with all 1255 names listed, so they will never be forgotten about again.

We have been working alongside NLC Restorative Justice, who have made us bird boxes, signs and we look forward to a continued partnership.

In the next few days, we will have a Wee Library box installed, where you can take a book and sit on the seat, taking in the peace and tranquillity or leave a book for others to enjoy.

We will continue to work to have the approx. 60 graves that lie behind the fence brought back in, so they are no longer separated and isolated from the others.
